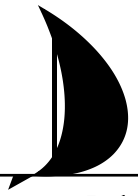

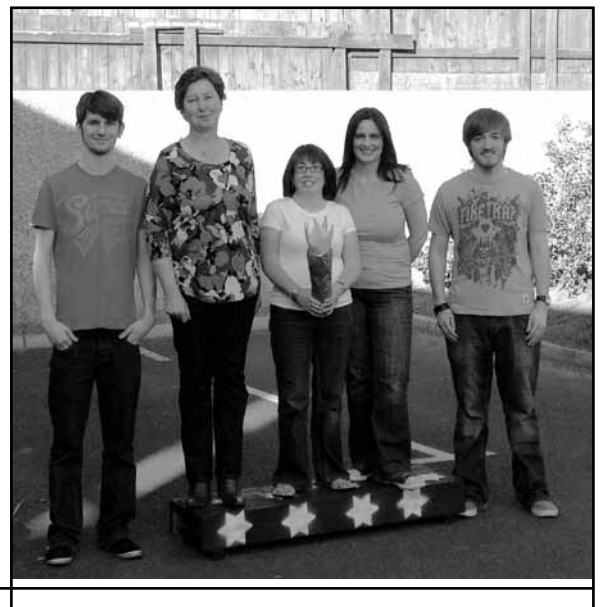

### *An easy Summer recipe for you to enjoy*

#### **Pan-seared sea bass with mango and chilli crushed potatoes (Serves 2)**

##### ***For the pan-seared sea bass***

*2 sea bass filleted, 1 tbsp olive oil  
salt and freshly ground black pepper*

##### ***For the mango and chilli crushed potatoes***

*300g/ 10½oz new potatoes, chopped  
2 tbsp olive oil  
2 tbsp fresh chopped chives  
¼ fresh mango, peeled, finely chopped or a tin of mango slices  
pinch dried chilli flakes  
salt and freshly ground black pepper  
2 large handfuls fresh spinach  
1 tbsp olive oil*

##### ***For the sweet and sour lime dressing***

*5 limes, juice of all, zest of 2  
2 tsp icing sugar  
2 tbsp olive oil  
1 tbsp chopped fresh chives*

For the pan-seared sea bass, carefully make two incisions in the sea bass skin. Heat a little olive oil in a frying pan, place the sea bass into the pan skin side down and fry for 1-2 minutes. Turn the fish over, turn off the heat and leave for 1-2 minutes to cook in the residual heat.

For the crushed potatoes, place the chopped potatoes into a pan of boiling salted water and boil for 10-12 minutes or until tender and drain. Add the olive oil and chives and roughly crush with a fork. Stir in the chopped mango, chilli flakes and season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Heat a little oil in a saucepan, add the spinach and wilt over a high heat for 1-2 minutes and season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Pour off the excess water and set aside.

*For the dressing, place the lime juice, zest and icing sugar into a small pan and place over a high heat. Bubble until reduced by half, stir in the olive oil and chives and set aside.*

To serve, place the crushed potatoes onto a serving plate, top with the wilted spinach and place the sea bass fillets on top and pour over the dressing.

## New Youth Team Leader appointed

St Columbanus' new Youth Team Leader is Jade Irwin who will take up her post in August. She is already excited about the challenges ahead of her and the fact that it came totally "out of the blue" doesn't daunt her in the slightest.

Previously, Jade had not worked within a church and admits when this job opportunity was first suggested to her, she actually "laughed". "I could not see myself working in a church setting," she added. However, her interest was caught the more she learned about the job especially since mentoring, which is a particular passion of hers, was highlighted in the job specification.

At present she works for Dreamscheme, a community youth development organisation in Castlereagh covering 6 different areas and 150 young people.

"I have been dealing with problems created by drugs and violence but my keen passion has been mentoring and doing small group work with young people. If a child comes to me with a drugs problem, for example, I love getting to the "core" of the issues, to find out what has caused that problem," she explained

Her enthusiasm and love of her job is evident but, had she remained with the organisation, Jade was aware that her role in it was changing so this new challenge has come along for her at just the right time.

Jade has also done a lot of youth work in Uganda and she was very pleasantly surprised to discover St Columbanus' close connections with Kiwoko. And in another extraordinary twist of fate, the very first team that Jade went to Uganda with was led by none other than Denise, now Rory Wilson's wife.

While in Uganda she was part of a group that helped village women learn how to make paper beads which have become enormously popular and are now a thriving business. She also worked with street children and was a volunteer with Abaana.

Jade, who now lives in Donaghadee, is originally from Belfast and attended Wellington College. On completing her 'A' levels she was accepted to

study English at Queen's University in Belfast but a last minute change of heart led to her studying for a Sociology degree, focusing on juvenile

delinquency. Currently, Jade is close to completing her Masters and is working on her thesis on the impact of prison life on female prisoners who have been victims of abuse. Her interest was sparked by knowing a lot of people who have been in that position - she points out that statistics show 86% of female prisoners have been victims of abuse. Looking ahead to her time in Ballyholme, Jade stressed that it is her intention to

get to know the young people in the church community, how they perceive themselves, their church and expectations of them.

"Out of that, some issues may arise. I am most excited about working in a church context, being able to talk about faith and how you can draw strength from that," she went on. Jade is aware that it will take months to build up trust with the young people, showing them she is "on their side", caring about their opinions, and she promises that she will be doing a lot of consultation with them.

In reply to her question "What would you like?" she is hoping to get a big list back in return in order to come up with a programme geared to their needs and ideas.

Arts, sport, drama and an acoustic cafe are just some of the ideas buzzing around in her head as well as developing intergenerational contact. In whatever spare time she has, Jade likes to play the guitar and also writes a lot of poetry. She says she loves living by the ocean, enjoys going to music gigs with her friends and is "addicted" to the gym. "I just love being social and doing social things," she added.

From talking to Simon and Sam and attending church services, Jade is aware that there is real diversity of thought and opinion within St Columbanus.

And her final word is to anyone out there with a passion for working with young people to come along and get involved - "There is always space for them," she added.

With the series tied at 1-1, both teams looked forward to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Test with confidence. 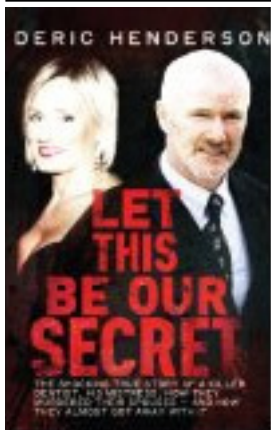


**John Darragh**

The eight mile Boundary Trail is one of the fairly new way marked routes in Castleward and opens up a lot of the estate which wouldn't have been previously accessible. We headed off across the Audleystown Road through some woodland and into the Mallard Plantation before reaching Tullyratty, an area of farmland designated as an Area of Special Scientific Interest.

saw our bull lying in the sun beside the track. From there it was back into the woodland called Mountain Wood following the single track to Base Camp. 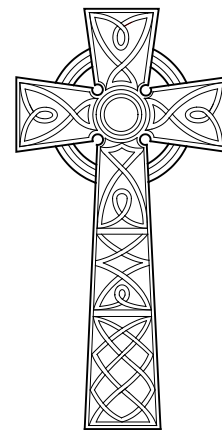
*«Here I am Lord, Is it I Lord?

## The Quiet Corner

### Silence



In the Book of Common Prayer the Service of Compline is the final church service in the Christian tradition of Canonical Hours. If you like, it's the completion of the working day. In many monasteries throughout Christendom it is customary to begin what is called the "Great Silence" after the evening service of Compline. During the "Great Silence" the whole monastic community, including guests, observe silence throughout the night until the next day.

I want to suggest that you stop reading this and sit still and quiet. I want you to bathe in the peace of silence and enjoy it.

Some people may be naturally silent and may readily appreciate silence. Others are awkward and nervous in prolonged silence; they shift about and cough and can't wait to start speaking. I am thoroughly earnest about this silence, so please, just pause a while.

In the Old Testament "Out of Silence" God spoke to Moses: "Out of Silence" God opened the heart and the mind of the prophet as to how Moses could communicate to God's people. God said to him "I am who I am".

As I ponder my way through this saying, I ask you to ponder with me. It is not easy in the busyness of our lives to ask ourselves to be still. Still and quiet. We want to talk; we want to run from silence to noise, from the silence of God to the noise of the world. We somehow want to escape into the noise - the noise which is unquestioning.

Think again of the saying "I am" but this time think of "I am" as meaning "I will be there".

No matter where you turn Jesus will be there.

No matter what emptiness you feel Jesus will be there and when you are wretched and in pain in mind and in body, Jesus will be there.

When you are filled with unutterable joy, Jesus will be there; when you move through life ordinarily without much excitement, Jesus will be there.

And when you are SILENT in prayer, be assured, Jesus will be there.
