There seems little doubt that Christ Himself wore the robes of the rabbi and it certainly didn't make him untouchable or stand-offish. Robes do not have to mean seriousness and stiffness. I have always felt it an honour to wear my distinctive Church of Ireland Sunday uniform. Moreover, before I step out to lead public worship, it's a poignant reminder for me of the Lamb whose blood has washed all of us white and clean before God.

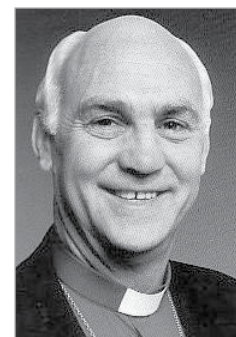

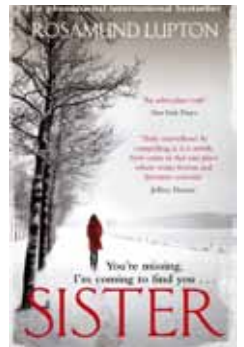

## Braemor Studies Series Launched with Three New Titles

A brand new series of selected dissertations emerging from Masters (MTh) students at the Church of Ireland Theological Institute (CITI) was launched at CITI on Wednesday 9 October 2013 by distinguished guest Canon Dr Christina Baxter. Published by Church of Ireland Publishing (CIP), the 'Braemor Studies Series' is an exciting development and the first three titles from CITI students who graduated in 2012 are:



- *The New Masculinity Movement: A Viable Model for Engaging Men with God and the Church?* by Alistair James Morrison. The Revd Alistair Morrison is currently curate of Ballyholme (Down).
- *New Monasticism – a Catalyst for the Church of Ireland to Connect with Society?* by Jonathan Campbell-Smyth. The Revd Jonathan Campbell-Smyth is currently curate of Jordanstown (Connor).
- *The Place of Lament and the 'Catharsis of the Complaint' in Response to the Problem of Evil* by John M Godfrey. The Revd John Godfrey is currently curate of Galway (Tuam).

The titles each include a preface by the Director of CITI, the Revd Dr Maurice Elliott. Dr Elliott said that the new publications marked a tangible product of the integrated learning and contextually based theology now offered at the Institute. Guest Dr Ray Refausse said that the Literature Committee was glad to see the Church of Ireland publishing on theological themes and pleased to have been able to assist the Institute in a venture which would benefit CITI, ordinands and the Church at large.

In launching the series formally, Dr Christina Baxter, former Principal of St John's College, Nottingham, said that she had been delighted as CITI's external examiner to have discovered three studies worthy of publication, 'each with something to offer to the wider public of this land'. She said, 'This series represents a significant moment for the Church of Ireland and something important for the Church more widely as products of contextual theology – it is important to undertake theology in one's own place.'

Alistair Morrison's *New Masculinity Movement* is significant in addressing the gender imbalances in parish life, 'provoking us to think how to help men to become involved in Church as well as children and women ... it is important to reimage the Church for the future.'

Dr Baxter concluded by congratulating everyone involved, especially the authors, each now ministering in the Church of Ireland, and by saying that she hoped all would read the new publications, especially as 'they would be very suitable Advent reading across every diocese, refining the Church's ministry into the season of Epiphany.'

## More than just a building

### **September Vestry Decision**

As you will know from the Rector's announcements in Church, at its meeting on 19 September the Select Vestry unanimously agreed to proceed to the next stage of its plan to restore our much loved church building, hopefully in 2016.

The prayers of the entire Ballyholme Church family are essential as we move forward on what is a serious and substantial undertaking for our parish as a whole. The Rector will offer a spiritual overview of the task at hand at our morning services on 24<sup>th</sup> November, St Columbanus Sunday.



Thank you to all those who have taken the time to browse through the *More than just a building* pages on the parish website. Many of you have expressed your appreciation for the effort expended so far and for the time we are taking to get things right. If you haven't yet had a chance to read the story of our four year journey to reach this point, we would encourage you to sit down at the computer for half an hour and appraise yourselves of the issues and areas of concern before us. In addition to the report of the 2009 *Have your say* consultation, you will find an introduction to the life of the restoration committee and the parishioners who have served on it. There is also an extensive discussion of our needs as they have been identified plus an executive summary.

### **The Next Stage**

Stage two will involve the appointment of an architect, the formulation of a finance plan, an opportunity for parish consultation and applications for statutory and Church of Ireland permissions. As we go to press, a process is being worked out for the appointment of an architect which we hope will be as transparent as possible (see below).

### **Appointment of Architect: Design Competition**

A Feasibility Study has been completed, which incorporates the following -

- Refurbishment of the Church Building, including conservation restoration works
- Alterations to the existing Parish Centre
- Linking the Church Building to the Parish Centre by means of a functional space.

The Select Vestry seeks to appoint an Architect to take the Feasibility Study to a full design.

Initially we are looking for expressions of interest from Architects who have experience in the restoration and refurbishment of listed buildings, and Church based projects of similar scope, scale and complexity to that described above.

A shortlist will be established from those interested by means of a Pre-Qualification Questionnaire. Each of the shortlisted candidates and their associated design teams, will be invited to prepare a comprehensive design scheme based on a fully developed briefing document. Following assessment, the successful team will be appointed to take the scheme forward.

## IMAGINE!

Building for the future is not easy! Trying to imagine what it might be like in say, 50 years' time is more of an art than a science. That is exactly what the Diocese of Kajiado set out to do when thinking about how their headquarters building could look like.



They imagined a fully sustainable Diocese to cope with its future growth. That's why there is rentable office space covering the complete ground floor. Already there is one charity organisation occupying two rooms. There are two more charities indicating that between them they will rent out the remainder of the ground floor as soon as it is complete. On the strength of this secure income the Diocese is completing an application for a loan so that the remaining work can be completed as soon as possible.

They further imagined being able to provide facilities for training and education purposes, not only for people within Kajiado but also for those outside of the Diocese. Training and equipping local leaders – for both physical and spiritual development – is probably the most effective thing the Diocese can and will do for many years to come. That is why there are three medium-sized meeting rooms and one very big meeting room built into the underground-ground lower section of the building.

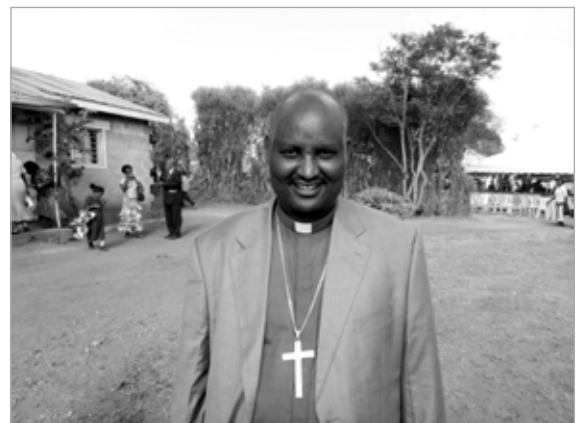
They then imagined a fully functioning Diocesan office, able to serve the growing number of churches across the whole of Kajiado - with all offices fully staffed and equipped to work

and minister to all levels of society to meet both their physical and spiritual needs. The first floor of the building is given over to this ministry and when it is complete it will be a vibrant Christian witness right at the heart of Kajiado Town. None of this would have been possible if it was not for the commitment of Ballyholme parish to look beyond its own parish boundaries and reach out in partnership to the Diocese of Kajiado. Imagine what

possible if we all committed ourselves to continue this partnership!

On behalf of CMS Ireland I would like to thank everybody who has played any part in making this partnership work – it is much appreciated.

## DUBLIN RE-VISITED

Recession – what recession? Certainly there was no evidence to suggest any shortage of cash in Dublin when we visited in October. The city was very much alive!

Seven of us took a (very) early train to Belfast to catch the Enterprise and at 11 o'clock joined hordes of other tourists in Dame Street for our tour. The large crowd was split into three and we had final year history student Jack as our leader. We saw many groups of people having guided tours as well as tour buses – all a good sign for Dublin. Jack began by giving us a succinct potted history of Ireland – just enough to grasp the salient facts but not so much that it seemed like a lesson. On then with the tour which included Trinity College, St Andrew's Church, Dublin Castle, Viking history, Temple Bar and much more. He pointed out Wood Quay, the site of an internationally important Viking Settlement. Here Dublin Corporation, after a massive but ultimately



unsuccessful public campaign against development, built new offices. Large-scale archaeological excavations took place on the site at intervals between 1974 and 1981 and finds are on display in the National Museum of Ireland. We ended up in the beautiful City Hall, built in 1779 by the Guild of Merchants as the Royal Exchange.

After a period of decline post Act of Union, the Dublin Corporation bought and named it the City Hall in 1852. Its Rotunda is most impressive and the personable Jack pointed out artifacts of interest as well as finishing off the tour by telling us the myth of Tir na nÓg, a place beyond the edges of the map, located on an island far to the west. It could be reached by either an arduous voyage or an invitation from one of its fairy residents. Our next walk is at Rostrevor on November 2<sup>nd</sup>. It's about 6 miles in parkland, riverside woodland and grass tracks. Meet at 9am in the Church car park.

Leona Lewis, RUN. That was the final song played as we left the service of thanksgiving for Catherine Montgomery on 23rd November 2012. She had very courageously lost her battle with kidney cancer. There could therefore be no other fitting tribute than for family and friends to join together to partake in the Bangor 10K. I was a novice runner who embarked upon the challenge to run the 10k and eagerly downloaded a six week training programme from the internet. I was blessed with fortunate weather throughout my training schedule and only had to return to the treadmill on one occasion (it is fair to say I am not an all weather runner!). After a day at work the last thing I wanted to do was hit the road for an arduous run, but I quickly reminded myself of the cause – Catherine's memory and Cancer Focus. Saturday 28th September saw the sun split the trees and spirits were high.



The run was to be a celebration in memory of a wonderful mother, wife and daughter, a dedicated, hardworking, caring Doctor and the most fun and true of friends you could ask for. Over 200 people participated in the event wearing Team Catherine T-shirts – we were a force to be reckoned with. In church I asked for three things – prayer, support and your hard earned cash. I was truly touched by the generosity of our congregation. As I write this article the current amount raised by Team Catherine for Cancer Focus (formerly Ulster Cancer Foundation) is an incredible £35,539.60. Every year Cancer Focus supports over 4,000 people living with cancer, provides 3,100 counselling sessions, supports almost 180 children whose parent is living with cancer and the list goes on. The local charity rarely receives a donation of this size and they are truly grateful, as am I.

## SEE A NEED, MEET A NEED

Hard to believe that it is November already, and we have been back to school/college for over two months now!! The homework is really kicking in, but Christmas is on the horizon. The shops are stocked with musical Christmas cards, mince pies and wrapping paper. The town Christmas lights will soon be switched on and the festive season is truly underway. There is no doubt about it that this is my favourite time of year, wrapping up in cosy hats and scarfs, carrying my take-away hot chocolate and late-night shopping in the city. I wonder amidst the homework pressures, jingling bells and Christmas present lists, are we aware of how this time of year can be so difficult for so many?

Mulled wine isn't quite so heart-warming when we have nobody to share it with. Christmas dinner does not taste quite so delicious when we are not surrounded by family and friends to accidentally spill the cranberry sauce over and pull crackers with. Christmas morning is just like every other morning for so many children who do not wake up to sofas filled with presents. Those who are lonely, bereaved, lost and lacking this Christmas need the energy and support of amazing young people who are prepared to go the extra mile to meet their needs.

Let's not kid ourselves that these issues don't exist, or that there is nothing we can do about them. The truth is quite the opposite – there is plenty we can do! Having worked with young people for many years, I know you can all be innovative, thoughtful, creative and hard-working. You can choose something from the list here, or think of your own idea either yourself or with your friends. See a need and meet a need this Christmas. The joy you bring from doing so will ripple far beyond what you will ever fully know.

- Give food, clothes or blankets to a homeless shelter
- Give your old toys to a children's ward in the hospital
- Invite someone on their own over for Christmas dinner
- Make Christmas gifts for your elderly neighbours or local nursing home
- Send a Christmas card to someone who can't get home for Christmas
- Get involved in Christmas church services, and invite people along
- Donate gifts to the Salvation Army or St Vincent de Paul Christmas appeals
- Give non-perishable food to the North Down Storehouse



*Christmas is approaching fast, so why not try this easy cake - good enough to grace any table*

### Christmas Cake

500g mixed dried fruit, 150g dried apricots, roughly chopped, 150g dried cranberries, 1 small lemon, 1 clementine, 8 tbsp Guinness, 150g blanched almonds, roughly chopped, 425 g S R flour, 1-2 teasp mixed spice, ¼ teasp salt, 225g unsalted butter, 225g soft dark muscovado sugar, 5 medium eggs, beaten, 3 tbsp black treacle.

Place mixed dried fruit, apricots and cranberries in a large bowl. Quarter the lemon and clementine, remove seeds from them and blend in a food processor until well puréed. Add the purée to the fruit with the Guinness, then cover and leave to soak for 8 hours or overnight, stirring occasionally. Next day add the chopped nuts, stirring until well mixed.

Preheat oven to 160C, fan oven 140C, Gas Mark 3. Line the bottom and sides of deep 8 in. square cake tin with a double or triple layer of greaseproof paper. Grease well. Sift the flour, spice and salt together. Cream the butter and sugar until fluffy. Gradually beat in the egg and then stir in the treacle. Finally, fold in the flour and fruit and nut mixture. Spoon into the cake tin, levelling the top and bake for 3 hours. Cover the top of the cake with buttered paper if browning too much. Test to see if it's done by inserting a skewer into the centre of the cake – if it comes out clean, the cake is done. Leave in the tin until cool enough to handle, and then turn out on to a wire rack until cold. Keep the paper on the cake and wrap with Clingfilm or kitchen foil when cold.

Wrap tightly in Clingfilm before icing and store for up to 4 months.



## The Quiet Corner No Limits



I often feel that as adults we can often learn from children. Their simple views of the world can often be liberating and their enthusiasm can be infectious.

When the Sunday School children sing in church they always put their heart and soul into it. They lead by example.

When they sing :-

*“My God is so big, so strong and so mighty  
There’s nothing that He cannot do”*

they really mean it, even without the encouragement of Alistair or Jade in the foreground. They put the adults to shame with their enthusiasm.

The truth is, they don’t have any limits or boundaries.

We need to follow that sentiment and not place limits on God’s power. It is scripturally sound. As one example, in Paul’s letter to the Ephesians (Chapter 3) he wrote:-

*“<sup>20</sup> Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, <sup>21</sup> to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.”*

So, we may be concerned for world events, the situation in Syria, the persecution of Christians in Africa, the Middle East or Asia, or we may be concerned about events closer to home, the divisions in our society in Northern Ireland, or perhaps about the employment situation. Or perhaps our issues are at the personal level, about serious illness of friends or family. What we must remember is just what the children express - there are no boundaries to what God can achieve.

Individually, and collectively, we can make a difference by calling on the greatest power of all.
