

We should absolutely feel empowered to scrutinize the people we have elected, not least to see that our choices are being carried out. God bless those recently returned to Westminster, but surely in the end it's not the politicians' government, it's ours.

Restoration Project - Update Planning Application

The architect has now submitted a planning application to the Ards and North Down Borough Council on behalf of the Select Vestry for the proposed restoration of and annex to the church building and Parish Centre. Part of the planning process involves notifying adjacent neighbours about the proposed scheme. In anticipation of this we invited our neighbours to an informal information evening on 16 April 2015. Thirty invitations were hand delivered of which three attended.

Programme

As we wait for planning approval, which may take a number of months, the architect has been instructed to progress to the next stage which is the preparation of detailed working drawings. This means that the overall scheme, subject to any further on-site changes, has been settled. The architect is working to a programme which would see the project commence on site in early January 2016. We are also working behind the scenes to find a suitable alternative venue which could accommodate our three Sunday morning services (8:30 am, 10:00 am and 11:30 am) and also provide additional rooms to facilitate our ever growing Children's Church.

Good News and not so Good News

The Parish has received approval for its Project from the Representative Church Body (RCB) Plans Committee. The RCB are the custodians of all Church of Ireland property across Ireland and are signatures, along with the builder, to the Building Contract. On a less positive note, an application for grant assistance from the Listed Places of Worship Roof Repairs Grant Scheme has been unsuccessful. However, there will be another bite at the cherry as the last Government provided more funding for the scheme to be re-run in September 2015. In the meantime, please keep your pledges coming in.

An article in National Geographic several years ago provided a penetrating picture. After a forest fire in Yellowstone Forest Park, forest rangers began their trek up a mountain to assess the inferno's damage. Third Time Lucky The Walkers in Kilfeaghan

It was well worth waiting for. The sun shone on a warm day in the Kilfeaghan Valley just east of Rostrevor in the very far west of the Mournes.



We were delighted to welcome visitors from Holland – Els and Lei who Betty had met in Bangor Marina.

Kilfeaghan is marked on a 17th century map as an ecclesiastical site and is thought to mean 'Fiachan's church'. It is a beautiful valley with a narrow road leading north close to the Cassywater River, which ends in a small car park near a ford in the Watergap River. Near the main road is the Kilfeaghan Dolmen which dates between 2000 and 1000 BC with a 35 ton capstone. It is thought to be one of the biggest in Ireland.

We began the walk by crossing the ford and headed up a track on a gradual slope along the side of Slievanowen past the hilltop called The Rowans and into and through a forest leading out onto the side of Slievemartin. The valley was full of the song of larks and even a cuckoo, with wild flowers (and one frog) just peeping through the grass. The views were long - all the way south across Carlingford Lough and east to the High Mournes. Most of the group continued to contour at about 300m past Slievefadda and Knockshee, down to the road and back to the ford. Meanwhile Rob and Betty headed steeply down the side of Slievefadda back to the picnic place to light the barbecues! This was a first for the group and very successful it was.

The next walk is on June 6 - destination to be decided.

Service of Thanksgiving 4 April 2015: Easter Eve

In a service prepared by Canon Mercer himself, a packed St Columbanus sang the praises of God in three hymns: *Be still, my soul, How bright those glorious spirits shine!* and *Ye holy angels bright* – the same three chosen for Mrs Jo Mercer's funeral in 2008. Jonathan Mercer read St Paul's central statement of resurrection hope from 1 Corinthians 15.

Welcoming the large congregation, Rector Number Three, Canon Simon Doogan extended a special welcome to Rector Number Two, Bishop Alan Abernethy on the one and only occasion when all three of Ballyholme's first rectors would ever be together in St Columbanus.

In his words of introduction the Rector said that before the phrases became fashionable Canon Mercer had been a Church Planter, the Leader of a Pioneer Ministry. St Columbanus Ballyholme wasn't just holy ground for Canon Mercer, he continued, it was his life's work. To the Canon's sons Jonathan and Simon, the Rector underlined the great esteem in which their father, their mother and their whole family was held by everyone in St Columbanus. Before introducing the first hymn the Rector said simply: "Your Dad loved this parish, and this parish loved your Dad."

The service was led by the Rector and the Reverend Duncan Pollock, Rector of Groomsport where Canon Mercer lived and worshipped in retirement. One of Canon Mercer's former bishops Dr Gordon McMullan offered the tribute (see below) and Bishop Alan led the Intercessions – from the Rector's Prayer Desk. Bishop Harold led the Farewell in Christ acknowledging the wonderful and timely parallel of the Canon's Maundy Thursday death and Easter Eve funeral – all in the faith and hope of the Resurrection to eternal life. Bishop Harold also mentioned the 24 years of retired ministry



Canon Mercer had given to the Diocese, especially to vacant parishes on the Ards Peninsula. Robed and sitting with the choir for the service were four of Canon Mercer's curate assistants: the Reverends Billy Marshall, Ivan Betts, Robert (AKA Keith) Townley and Ray Devenney. Canon David Humphries was present in the congregation and apologies were received from the Reverends Mervyn Dickson and Nigel Waugh, neither of whom could make it given the shortness of notice. In a moving conclusion to the service the Choir sang the *Nunc Dimittis* as the family carried Canon Mercer's remains to the door. Our Parish Centre reception proved a warm and comforting end to a funeral conducted in obvious Church of Ireland style and fervent Christian hope. The private family interment at St Elizabeth's Churchyard Dundonald was led by the Rector, the Reverend Duncan Pollock and Bishop Gordon McMullan.

Obituary from the Bangor Spectator : John James Glendinning Mercer

Canon Mercer, or Jack as he was universally known, who died last week at the age of 94, was a hugely popular figure and was the first Rector of St Columbanus Parish Church in Ballyholme. The church was filled to overflowing for his funeral on Saturday and as his son Simon said, "It was a good old-fashioned Church of Ireland funeral. He would have loved it."

Canon Mercer was born in Belfast before the family moved to Dundonald. He left school at the age of 14 and went to work in the Post Office. During the war, he joined the NAFFI and it was there that he met his wife Jo and she encouraged him as he thought of the ministry. Dean Sammy Crooks, the 'Black Santa' also gave great encouragement.

Jack studied successfully and was admitted to the School of Divinity in Trinity College, Dublin. His first appointment was curate in St Mark's, Newtownards. He then served as curate for Bangor Parish before being appointed the first Rector of St Columbanus in 1955.

He retired in 1990 but continued to help out, particularly in Portaferry, where he would often conduct the service as well as playing the organ - a sort of one-man band.


The funeral service was conducted by the Rector Simon Doogan, assisted by Rev Duncan Pollock (Groomsport Parish), Bishop Gordon McMullan, Bishop Alan Abernethy (who had been Rector of St Columbanus) and Bishop Harold Miller. Bishop Edward Darling also attended.

ii Canon Mercer was a keen sportsman all his life. He played cricket for CIYMS, Senior League hockey for North Down and golf at Clandeboye. The latter had started out with a few clerics inspired by the late Hammy Leckey. Jack found he loved the game and joined Clandeboye in 1980. He was a member of the Leprechauns' Society that played at the club on Wednesdays and went on outings. He played until last summer before health problems forced him to stop. He was alert to the very end and delighted in crosswords. His wife Jo died in 2008 and he is survived by his sons Jonathan and Simon. Another son, Colin, pre-deceased him.

Forward March

Our Parish of Ballyholme was born on the 1st January 1955 and its first Rector was Rev J J G Mercer. His institution took place on 5th March 1955 and, as the records show, in front of a capacity congregation.

I gleaned this information from a small book entitled 'A Short History of the Church of Ireland in Ballyholme.' Its author was the Rev Jack Mercer and firstly it covered the period from 1927 to 1940 noting a special service held on 20th November, 1927, to mark the opening of a new hall at a cost of £900! Many will recall with a certain degree of fondness, this wooden structure which, for some time, served as a primary school. Despite the onset of war, on 6th July 1939, the foundation stone for the church was laid.



A chapter, 'A Daughter Church from 1940 to 1954' dealt in detail with the building of our much loved church of Saint Columbanus and its consecration on 22nd June 1940 and the inevitable move to a separate Parish in January 1955.

Following his appointment in 1955, the Rev Jack Mercer oversaw the purchase of the Rectory at 3 Ward Avenue. With an expanding congregation it became necessary to increase accommodation for all the organisations resulting in a new Parochial Hall which was dedicated on 17th January 1965. I mention these milestones because there is no doubt that Canon Jack, as he became, was the right man in the right place and at the right time for this growing Parish. He had been literally the foundation stone upon which God's work has been built in Ballyholme. The title of his book 'Forward March' was truly apt.

My family has been associated with St Columbanus from those early days and we were fortunate to know Jack and Jo and their children for all of those 34 years or so that he ministered to and with us.

My father, Reggie served as his Rector's Churchwarden and both he and my mother, Dorrie sang in the choir for many years.

As with many of our families in the Parish he was involved in all the highs and lows of family life and I have no doubt that his influence played a role in our formative years. My sister Angela and I were baptised, confirmed, and married under his guidance and my three children were baptised and confirmed in St Columbanus.

I had the privilege of serving as his warden in 1980 which happily coincided with the 25th Anniversary of his appointment as Rector. The occasion was celebrated in typical Ballyholme fashion with plenty of food and good craic. As a warden you realised that if anything was out of place in the church on a Sunday morning at 8.30am. you had to put it right, not next week, but immediately. I recall changing a light bulb high up in the ceiling between services using a very unsteady ladder.

Canon Jack placed great emphasis on things being done efficiently and, as is said nowadays, he had all the necessary "skill set" of wise leadership and a vision for the future.

His renowned attention to detail also extended to the chair of the vestry and it's good to look back on those meetings and remember that he had the knack of mixing business with pleasure.

I will conclude with a quote from the end of his book which is just as relevant today as it was all those years ago.

He comments "we pray that we who have received such goodly heritage may guard it zealously and hand it on unsullied to generations yet unborn". Geoffrey Johnston

Tribute Canon John (Jack) James Glendinning Mercer

The following is the address of Bishop Gordon McMullan at the funeral service of Canon Jack Mercer published in the Church of Ireland Gazette.

Today, we join in the church of St Columbanus to say our earthly farewell to, and give thanks for, a

man whose life impacted for good on many other lives as a friend and brother in Christ. We also join in prayerful support for the family in their bereavement with the passing from this earthly life of a loving father, father-in-law and grandfather.

Trust and assurance undergird our prayers this day - Easter Eve - the day between the Cross, the Grave and the Resurrection to eternal life and the life-giving power of God manifested in Jesus Christ, our eternal Saviour.

It is entirely fitting that this church and house of prayer should be Canon Jack Mercer's last resting place before he is taken on his last earthly journey - to the place of his burial - because this church and the parish of Ballyholme were at the heart and centre of his ordained service for 35 of his 40 years of dedicated priesthood and pastoral ministry.

This dedication was honoured through the conferment of diocesan and central Church canonries, allied to the entrustment of important responsibilities and duties in diocesan, central and other bodies and in educational provisions. The fruit of that much blessed ministry was evidenced in the growth, strength and stability of his rectorship and in the strong foundations on which his successors have continued to build and minister in the parish of Ballyholme.

A number of qualities and characteristics contributed to Canon Mercer's effective ministry. One was his openness to people of varying backgrounds. Another was his deep love for, and loyalty to, the Church of Ireland as an important instrument of Christ's witness and service in this island and outwards into the wider world from which it had gained and to which it gave.

That receiving and giving are well represented in the saints whose lives and ministries are prayerfully honoured in stained-glass remembrance in the windows around us: St Columba, St Patrick, St Columbanus, St Comgall, St Gaul, St Brendan, St Finnian and St Brigid.

Canon Mercer approached life's opportunities and challenges with active, positive and constructive energy of mind, spirit and body. In his leisure activities, as well as in his parish and wider Church involvements, this was his pattern of life.

As a young man, he was a fine cricketer and hockey player, in addition to his academic progress and preparation for ordination.

In later years, he much enjoyed his golf and the companionship of the members of Clandeboye Golf Club's Leprechauns group of golfing friends, as well as his golfing rounds with fellowclergy friends.

His competitive energy was also seen on the mats of Ballyholme parish's indoor bowling club.

More relaxed were those evenings when the rector of Ballyholme, Canon Simon Doogan, and his wife invited some of us retired clergy into the rectory for supper and informal companionship.

In giving thanks for Canon Jack Mercer's life and ministry, it is essential to include his beloved wife, Jo, whose outgoing friendship-making, greatly respected personality and wholehearted support were essential elements in their united Ballyholme ministry years.

Jo's death must have been a very deep loss to all the family, but the Mercer spirit and commitment honoured Jo's memory by continuing the dedicated effort they had shared for many years.

Finally, may I express on our behalf to the family members - sons, daughters-in-law, grandchildren, those on earth and those in God's nearer presence - our appreciation of their love and support to Jack and Jo Mercer - parents and grandparents.

I recall those scriptural words from St John's Gospel: "I am the resurrection and the life, saith the Lord: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die."

We now leave in God's eternal love our much loved and respected parent, friend, priest and pastor - John James Glendinning Mercer.

May he indeed rest in peace and rise in glory.

An extract from the last magazine before his retirement......

Very soon now the board of Nomination will be meeting to appoint my successor. Please remember them in your prayers as they discharge their responsibility.

Finally, may I say what a joy it has been to have had the privilege of being the first Rector of Ballyholme Parish. Thirty five and a half years is a long time in one place and at a time like this the memories come flooding back. But above all is the happiness of having been involved as a servant of Christ and of His people in this parish. My wife joins me in thanking you all for your



forbearance, support and love, coupled with the prayer that God will richly bless you and the work and witness of Ballyholme Parish in the days ahead. Yours in Him Jack Mercer

Over the years he served the club in various guises, as President during his years as Rector and later when he took a more active playing role, as Chairman, and Match Secretary, responsible for arranging club competitions and friendly matches with other local clubs.

"Just so we're clear" said the Rector to Canon Mercer: "that wasn't me!"

Anxious that Canon Mercer should see the first draft set of plans before anyone else, Simon made a visit to Canon Mercer in Groomsport bearing folded paper gifts. When Simon asked if there was anything Canon Mercer would have done differently had they been building it all over again, his characteristically modest reply was "How long have you got?" The Canon not only showed great interest in the project, but as the man with a better working knowledge of St Columbanus than anyone, he was ready with a number of helpful suggestions.

Perhaps the most interesting point that emerged was that 'those in authority' had always been concerned about the lack of a second Church door. In offering his support and encouragement to Restoration 2016, Canon Mercer said graciously "I am the past, this is the future. I wish you every success with your endeavours."

With hindsight, the Sunday evening of a Bank Holiday weekend may not have been the best timing for the Kiwoko night at St Columbanus'. Rory, Gideon and I arrived, just as the Mission Committee had sat down for a well earned quick cup of tea. They had arranged chairs, tables and folded coloured napkins (reflecting the colours of the Ugandan flag – such attention to detail!). If no one else had turned up, their hard work preparing the hall would have meant a lot to encourage us. I stood at the front of the hall ready to give my brief account of the last year at

Kiwoko from my perspective. As I looked at the rows of seats *all* filled with friends, family and active supporters, I was all at once overwhelmed by my own unworthiness, and encouraged by the love and interest expressed in the expectant faces waiting to hear what I had to say.

The atmosphere was relaxed and homely. We talked about Kiwoko; Jade, Laura and Cameron led the very meaningful praise and worship; and we interviewed a couple of people from the META team heading to Kiwoko in August. Simon gave an encouraging message and CMSI representatives prayed for us along with family and friends. It was a very uplifting evening. Old and young, various denominations and walks of life were represented, with everyone united in their interest and support for Kiwoko, and of course us.

As we stood there and people encouraged us, inside I felt a bit guilty. Often people say they admire our faith to take risks and our ability to leave the 'life' we had or could have had in Ireland behind. That word 'life' is synonymous with comfort/higher wages/convenience/health care etc. Perhaps for us that might have been true the first time that we headed for Africa, but actually now we are heading to a place where we do feel comfortable, we don't need high wages and we have access to most things that we need. Above all we love the life that we are so privileged to live in Uganda - a life that is only made possible by the support of many – for the Hospital at large and for us personally. Many of those supporters were there. Yes there are challenges to overcome, yes there are frustrations, yes we miss not being down the road from family BUT as I looked around the hall on Sunday night, I thought about some of the circumstances that some of these people are in: challenges in the work place; despite being in the same country as family not actually seeing them very often; the responsibilities of raising a young family; loneliness; health concerns..... I felt a bit guilty that no one was cheering them on and praising them for being courageous and hanging onto their faith despite their circumstances. Inasmuch as we are being cheered on in our Kiwoko journey, we also commend you our dear friends and family for your courageous faith in a (spiritually) cooler climate here in Ireland. Well done or 'Mujebale' as they say in Uganda.

1 Timothy 6:11-12 'But you man (or woman) of God, flee from all this, and pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance and gentleness. *Fight the good fight of the faith*. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made your good confession in the presence of many witnesses.'

They learned how to separate in the compounds (the areas around their houses) the latrine and cooking areas. Aren't you glad we have kitchens - as I write this the rain is lashing down and the wind is howling and I am so glad that I can cook indoors this evening!! However in Kiwoko people cook outside over charcoal fires. *Denise helped the judging of the compounds all have to be swept everyday to prevent the build up of leaves which harbour insects carrying diseases. The winner was so thrilled with her prize of sand and



bricks! She will build a permanent structure for storing her kitchen utensils away from animals, insects and small children. Hopefully everyone has benefitted from this learning and will have healthier homes and families because of the leadership of the Mothers' Union.

* Denise has the luxury of a small kitchen with a gas stove and oven and intermittent electricity for the kettle and toaster. But there is still a fire outside for heating water for washing clothes, boiling water to purify it for drinking and making the local speciality Matoke, a cooked banana dish.

A Question of Faith

In fact this quiet corner begins with a question. Almost a year ago Laura asked me, "Gareth, would you consider helping out at Children's Church?" I said "of course". Laura thanked me and went on her way but I almost immediately began to question my decision. What had I let myself in for? What age group would I get? Would I be any good at it? What was Children's Church even about?

Well at least I knew the answer to this latter question. Clearly it would be about me conveying my superior knowledge of the Christian faith to the young people of our Church – I was arrogant enough to believe that a year ago.

The truth is the young folk of Splash have taught me more about faith than anything that I could have taught them.

We are genetically designed to question everything – and a good thing too. Without questioning we would still think the world was as flat as a pancake and at the centre of the universe. Without questioning we would have made no advances in medicine or science. Without questioning how could we consider the morality of war, slavery or injustice? Questioning has forged our past and present and it will continue to shape our future. But when it comes to a question of faith perhaps we should turn to our children. Parish Defibrillator

At the beginning of last month we took delivery of a piece of equipment now found in most buildings open to the public but which we hope we shall never have to use.

Originally, it was one of our young people who had felt moved to make a special gift to parish funds as a thank offering to God. When the need for a

defibrillator was identified by our Health and Safety Sub-Committee, the family of the young person decided to match the young person's sum and the purchase was made possible.

Then it became clear that a little extra was required to cover 'kit and training'. Within 24 hours of mentioning the shortfall we had two offers to make up the difference. We want to acknowledge the generosity of these anonymous donors and what it means for the peace of mind of our whole church family that we now have what we need should the worst happen.

The next stage for us is to train staff and parishioners in the all-important task of responding to a First Aid emergency and we expect to be in a position soon to ensure representatives from all our organizations are given the opportunity to acquire the necessary skills. Should there be any suspicion of a heart attack, the defibrillator we have bought diagnoses the problem itself and, crucially, cannot be deployed unless the vital signs compel it to do so.

We are also keen, to ensure we can provide the best possible care, to hear from qualified parishioners who would be willing to assist should an emergency arise. If you would be prepared to help and hold a current certificate in Emergency First Aid or Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) please leave your name with Kelly in the Parish Office following which we will get in touch to discuss how you could help.
