Have you ever sat there listening to a sermon thinking "I know what's coming next"? It's Northern Ireland I'm afraid. Surrounded by churches and preachers as we are, there's a language, vocabulary and even tone that's easy to fall into. But it's not just the clergy. After March's atrocity in Westminster a journalist called Stig Abell wrote: "When murderous carnage happens, it always feels that our linguistic response is inadequate. We count the clichés: 'thinking of the victims and their families'; 'at this difficult time'; 'shoulder to shoulder'; 'pray for London'; 'there are no words'. But the use of cliché is itself a sign of something important: it is a bid for connection. Cliché demonstrates community, our intention to understand one another. By using cliché, we are trying



to employ common currency, we are grasping for tokens – however smoothed by overuse – that we all can handle and share." God's Word is an ever flowing fountain of freshness and inspiration so my preacher's antenna is always twitching for new illustrations and personal stories. But as a Church which treasures its Collects, it's good to remember that in its 'collectivity' the time-tested isn't just consoling and comforting but life-giving and redeeming.

The Walkers at the Blue Lough

Another baker's dozen gathered at the car park at Carrick Little just above Annalong for our May outing to the Blue Lough. We welcomed Yvonne Manogue, Michael and Cathy Body and Alice Armstrong to the group.

The east wind was keen at the start with a haze out to sea and clouds over the High Mournes but we soon warmed up on the first gentle ascent north up the track towards Annalong Forest. We crossed the Mourne Wall through a gate where the stile used to be and trekked on up the path along old quarry tracks in open heathland. Much of the route was originally paved with granite slabs, evidence of stone working. From where the path crosses the small stream flowing from the Blue Lough we had great views of Slieve Lamagan and Donard to the north and Binnian to the south west. The small outcrop of rock close by is named Percy Bysshe after the poet. It was used for bombing practice during WW11 from offshore ships!



On cue the sun came out for our Blue Lough lunch spot and from there all but Betty (with the sore knee) headed on up to the saddle between Lamagan and Binnian from where they had beautiful views down into the Ben Crom reservoir.

The next outing on 10th June (note change of date) is being organised by Brian to the village of Benburb with a walk along the Ulster Canal.




The Midnight Gang by David Walliams

John and Mildred Visit Ballyholme

The Rev Canon John Simons and his wife Mildred, who were visiting Ireland for the first time as guests of Pat Davidson, joined us at one of the recent PUSH prayer meetings.

Pat met John at the CMJ (Church's Ministry among Jewish People) International Conference in Jerusalem two years ago and again last December. When John mentioned that he and Mildred were coming to London to attend the Alpha Leaders Conference in the Albert Hall and that they had never been to Ireland before, it seemed an ideal opportunity for them to come to Northern Ireland for a few days.



Pat was delighted to have John speak on the "The Power of Forgiveness" at the CMJ Spring Meeting in Knockbreda Parish Church on Saturday 6th May.

John and Mildred were born in Cape Town, South Africa. John became a Christian during the great revival in 1974-75 in Cape Town and emigrated to Australia in 1982 on a business opportunity. He studied theology and prepared for ordination in Brisbane. They went back to South Africa and John ministered there until 1998 and served as the first National Director of Sharing of Ministries Abroad (SOMA).

John and Mildred returned to Australia mid 1998 for ministry and he served as National Director of the Haggi institute in Australia and

also National Director of SOMA Australia. Since 2007 John has been serving as a priest in the Diocese of North Queensland and he is also a member of the CMJ board in Australia.

John and Mildred enjoyed their time in Ballyholme and came along to the Police Male Voice Concert in St Columbanus. This was as unexpected treat for John who used to sing in a Barber Shop Quartet.

Following the Sunday morning service they had the opportunity to chat to Rory and Denise Wilson and other Parishioners over coffee. John had visited Kiwoko Hospital some years ago when Ian Clarke was Medical Director.

John and Mildred fitted in a visit to the North Down Heritage Centre where they found out a little bit about the Irish Saints and after a few days sight seeing they set off for South Africa to minister there.

Life to the full? I never knew! My journey to Saint Columbanus.

My parents brought me up in a strict Gospel Hall where the teachings were based on fear and the emphasis was on the wrath of God. This upbringing left many psychologically scarred.

I remember from a very young age the preachers proclaiming loudly about the possibility of sudden death or Jesus returning in the night.... taking your parents but leaving the unsaved behind. I checked on many occasions if they were still there.

We did not have TV. I was not allowed to go to pictures or attend any other Christian church. Other examples of the "rules" were not being allowed to cut our hair or wear trousers (girls).

Sunday was not a joyful day but a day to endure.

After training as a nurse I left home and did not attend any church for 33 years except for weddings and funerals. I maintained my faith in God and did feel the need to belong to a church.... but which one? My husband was brought up and Confirmed in the Church of Ireland but like many people did not attend often but retained a great affection for the Church of Ireland and its teachings. My two stepdaughters were brought up in Saint Columbanus and as we lived nearby it seemed the right choice, when just over four years ago I decided to take the steps to Baptism and Confirmation. In February 2013 two other adults and myself prepared for Confirmation. We met with Simon in the rectory on Tuesday nights for six weeks. Simon set out clearly the teachings of the Bible and the origins of the Church of Ireland. There was time for discussion and prayer. I found it all very enlightening and comforting.

On 24th March 2013 aged 55, Simon kindly baptised me in the afternoon with a few

parishioners present. It was a lovely occasion... quiet and meaningful. That evening we three adults along with the lovely young people were confirmed by Bishop Harold ...another happy, memorable time! How did I not know that God wanted me to enjoy life and live it to the full as it says on the young people's hoodies?

Sundays are now something I look forward to... services full of joyful worship and sermons from Simon about how Jesus led his life and how we should try to emulate this within our daily lives and community. Meeting with my fellow "travellers on the journey" also brings me much comfort and happiness. Life still brings many challenges...that doesn't change because you decide to follow Jesus Christ but we have an ever present Guide and Comforter.

Thanks to our own superheroes – our lovely leaders and to all of the children who came and made the week such a joy!



June is the business end of a busy year for many of our young people at Ballyholme Parish. The summer has quickly come upon us and the whole year of preparation is now finished with the dreaded end of year exams.

At YF, we recently started a new series called 'How To Get Yourself Through School' and we have been looking at all sorts of issues and challenges that young people face in their schools. We began our series with a discussion around our talents and how we should work hard to capitalise on the gifts and abilities that God has given us. The idea of hard work beats talent when talent doesn't work hard was a big discussion point as we wrestled with how we can balance school work and our social life. We were reminded of Colossians 3:23 that 'whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord.'



With the pressures of schoolwork and examinations, we are reminded by that verse in Proverbs 3:5 to trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. Our motto for Ballyholme Parish Youth is 'living life to the full' and it is hard to live that full life when we are worried by all the pressures and challenges around us. It is so important to learn that we are not created to have worry as part of our being. God created us to be full of faith and joy.

Jesus tried to change our focus from fear and worry to faithfulness when he says in Matthew 6:26: "Look at the birds of the air: they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life? And why do you worry about clothes? See how the lilies of the field grow. They do not labour or spin. Yet I tell you not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these."

Jesus himself said "by myself, I can do nothing" and this has been my challenge to the young people throughout their studies to: **stop telling God how big their problems** are and to start telling their problems how big their God is. As Christians, it is so important that we recognise that we 'live life to the full' by the Father's strength and guidance. This allows us the freedom to enjoy the blessing of life and the opportunities to study and learn.

Please continue to pray for all our young people over the next few weeks as they complete their end of year exams and many are completing their GCSEs and A-Level exams as well. The Parishioner
