



I first met Roger and his wife Christine in 2001. Roger was serving in Hastings, East Sussex when I moved from St Finnian's Belfast to West Sussex to be Domestic Chaplain to the Bishop of Horsham.

At that time Roger was both vicar of St Matthew's and Rural Dean of Hastings. It turned out Roger and I had a couple of things in common: we'd both taken law degrees first time around and, far more importantly, we both liked cricket.

Roger cut his preaching teeth in Holy Trinity Brompton and the Round

Church in Cambridge and so carrying a wide experience of parish life, he was a natural choice to be made "The Venerable" and become Archdeacon of Horsham. At that point the Combes family moved from East Sussex to West Sussex: cue lots of jokes about wise men arriving from the east. Suffice to say we became colleagues and friends and have kept up the contact off and on over the years.

In 2014 Roger retired to Crawley near Gatwick and he has been contributing on an occasional basis to the Bible Reading Fellowship daily notes series ever since.

A one night airport stopover for us last autumn made possible a pre-Church Sunday breakfast with Roger and Christine on Armistice Day (hence the poppies). That was our opportunity to tell them all about Ballyholme but lo and behold – wait for it – they decided to come anyway! Having preached Harvest for me in Aghalee in 2006, Roger and Christine subsequently forged new connections with our part of the world on acquiring a 'Norn Irish' son-in-law. I know you will make them welcome on their first visit to Bangor.



Not a tame lion: God and C S Lewis

Please join us for a five week course based on the writing and life of C S Lewis. The course explores C S Lewis' understanding of and experience of God partly through his children's story, 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' and partly through the story of his own late romance and marriage with Joy Davidman, as told in the film, 'Shadowlands. Each session uses clips from the films of 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' and 'Shadowlands' as starting points for discussion and includes opportunities for prayer and reflection. The course will run on Tuesday mornings from 10.00 to 11:30am and be repeated on Wednesday evenings from 8-9.30pm. The course will begin on Tuesday 30th April and run until the end of May. 
"MEMORIES OF CHILDHOOD AND YOUTH"



I always think that we all live, spiritually, by what others have given us in the significant hours of our life. These significant hours do not announce themselves as coming, but arrive unexpectedly. Nor do they make a great show of themselves; they pass almost unperceived. Often, indeed, their significance comes home to us first as we look back....

Much that has become our own in gentleness, modesty, kindness, willingness to forgive, in veracity, loyalty, resignation under suffering, we owe to people in whom we have seen or experienced these virtues at work, sometimes in a great matter, sometimes in a small. A thought which had become an act sprang into us like a spark, and lit a new flame within us.

If we had before us those who having thus been a blessing to us, and could tell them how it came about, they would be amazed to learn what passed over from their life into ours.





Good News at Ten on 3rd March was led by Denise and Team Kiwoko - nine men from the parish who made a short five day visit to Uganda in January (see their article in the March edition of the Parish magazine). They repeated their presentations at the 11.30 service.

It was a joyous occasion with all members of the team dressed in "Rory-like" apparel, (Ugandan shirts) and included a rousing chorus of "This little light of mine" led by Patrick accompanied by African drums. There were enough children dressed in Ugandan football



strips to form a football team, and their involvement in asking their fathers the questions really strongly emphasised the FAMILY of our family service.

On the subject of dress sense, the Rector certainly pulled a surprise out when he stripped off his outer vestments to reveal his own colourful Ugandan shirt which he then displayed proudly for the duration of the service. Perhaps it helped give him extra African rhythm for his impressive drum playing later in the service.

We were given a snapshot of life in Kiwoko focusing on the Christian ethos of the hospital and the work being undertaken by the staff under Dr Peter's leadership. The influence of the hospital is far reaching as support staff and volunteers provide vital preventative services in the community. The impact in dramatic reductions in numbers of patients suffering from malaria, polio, measles, worms and HIV was encouraging to hear.

The visit made a huge impact on each and every member of the team - words such as "moving" and "inspirational" were used to describe the dedication of the staff as they served the community.

It was a truly amazing experience but only the beginning of a journey for these men - there is a strong bond of fellowship between the men who now wish to support the work of the hospital as more donors are





needed to continue to provide the services which are making such a positive impact on the community. The link between our Parish and Kiwoko Hospital started 14 years ago when we sent Rory out to serve there. We were told how the strength of this link, and its value to the hospital had been symbolically celebrated in the planting of a shade tree by the team while they were there. There have been several visits from parishioners over the years, but perhaps this is now the start of a fresh phase of the relationship between Ballyholme Parish and Kiwoko Hospital.

To hear more from the group and the work of the hospital, The Friends of Kiwoko will be meeting

in our church hall on Sunday 28th April at 6.30pm. Please put the date in your diary, we'd love to see you!

The Sunday following Team Kiwoko's report, St Columbanus welcomed a visiting Bishop from the Anglican Church of Tanzania.

Darlingon Bendakeha is assistant bishop in the Diocese of Kaggera and he had been invited to Bangor by Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church for the evening of Sunday 10 March to talk about the impact Christianity Explored is making in his part of East Africa. Of course in Ballyholme we completed our own Christianity Explored course last year, so it was good to hear of how it is impacting many in the Diocese, not least in their Confirmation preparation classes.



The bishop was one of twenty-nine attending a 'New Bishops' induction conference at the end of January in Canterbury and Lambeth and on his brief stay in Co Down he was keen to see something of the Church of Ireland. Certainly the flurries of snow outside while he was preaching made sure that he knew that he was not at home in Tanzania.

Present for both 10 and 11.30 services, Bishop Darlington enjoyed the variety of our worship very much, both the

spectrum of ages and informality of Good News at Ten, and the reverence and tradition of our choir-led Holy Communion service at 11.30. As delighted by the children as they were by him, Bishop Darlington was glad to meet members of both congregations over refreshments between the services and brought greetings from his wife and four grown-up children.

On the first Sunday of Lent, he spoke on the response of Christ to the devil's temptations in the wilderness. "It is written, it is written, it is written, it is written" replied Jesus to each of Satan's entrapments . A walk through Lent, Bishop Darlington preached, is best kept in the company of Christ, the One who alone has the words of eternal life.

The night began with an update on DR Congo, one of Africa's most troubled nations where CMSI has three long-standing partnership links. On hand with the latest from Uganda was Dr Rory Wilson who reported on the recent Ballyholme team visit to Kiwoko and introduced us to the new staff appointments who are continuing the hospital's 'We treat, Jesus heals' ministry.

South Sudan is another important CMSI outpost and we heard the latest on Billy Smith from Moira, currently attempting to re-launch the Yei

Vocational Training Centre. Short-term STEP opportunities and teams remain important parts of CMSI's annual calendar and this year team trips to Egypt and Zambia are planned.

For many years CMSI has prepared a four week children's Sunday School programme. This year's resource includes DVDs, leaders resources and activity work sheets and is called 'Outside In' focussing on Nepal. The material was introduced with a sneak preview of one of the four videos.



The Columbanus Walkers' original March outing to the Granite Trail in the Mournes was cancelled because of bad weather. A week later, 7 members headed south and decided that a walk in the shelter of Tollymore Forest Park was preferable to the more exposed Granite Trail.

Our walk was in the valleys of the Shimna and Cascade rivers, both of which were in full spate following several days of rain. The sound of rushing water accompanied much of our walk.




