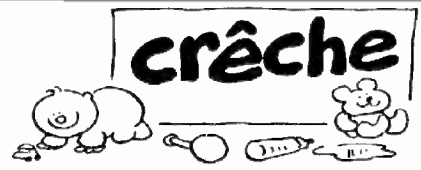

Jo Mercer

“Hello pet, how are you?” This was Jo Mercer’s constant greeting on meeting you.

Jo, who was part of Ballyholme Parish for so many years, passed away peacefully in July of this year. Her funeral was held in the church, where she spent many happy times. The church was filled – a true tribute to the lady she was and a reflection of the esteem in which she was held within our parish.



As a child, Jo lived in the Donegall Road area of Belfast and was a pupil of Ulsterville Primary School. She then proceeded to the Belfast Technical College, where she undertook the Secretarial and Business Studies course, before starting work in W. F. Neill’s Estate Agency. She met Jack when they both worked in the accounts department of the N.A.F.I., and they married in 1951 in St. Nicholas’s Parish Church, Belfast. Jack at this time was a curate in St. Mark’s, Newtownards before being installed as Rector of Ballyholme Parish in 1955, where they remained for 35 years. Jo and Jack had three sons, Colin, Jonathan and Simon, who in time got married and presented them with seven grandchildren – Simon, William, Christopher, Jessica, Ryan, Jack and Rory, who brought them great happiness.

Jo had a lifelong interest in the Guiding Association and became latterly a valued member of the Trefoil Guild.

Her concern for the underprivileged led her to help found the Oxfam shop in Bangor, where she gave her time and service for many years.

However, it is probably the Mothers’ Union, that we most associate Jo with. She was the enrolling member for Ballyholme Parish for an incredible 30 years. But her inspiration went further than the local branch and her gifts were recognised on a much wider scale in the Diocese and beyond. Jo served as the Diocesan Honorary Secretary and Diocesan President, and also on the Central Committee of the Mothers’ Union worldwide.

She came to know many members in distant parts of the world. This was brought home on the occasion of the opening service of a world wide conference in York Minister. As she left the great West door, she walked across to a band of African ladies, who immediately embraced her and then began to dance and sing. She knew them and they knew her through correspondence and prayer as sisters in the Lord in the worldwide fellowship of the Mothers’ Union.

Jo Mercer was a lovely lady, whose smile brightened every occasion, whose presence radiated happiness and whose everyday life was the embodiment of the words of the Westminster Confession of faith – “Man’s chief end is to glorify God and enjoy Him for ever”

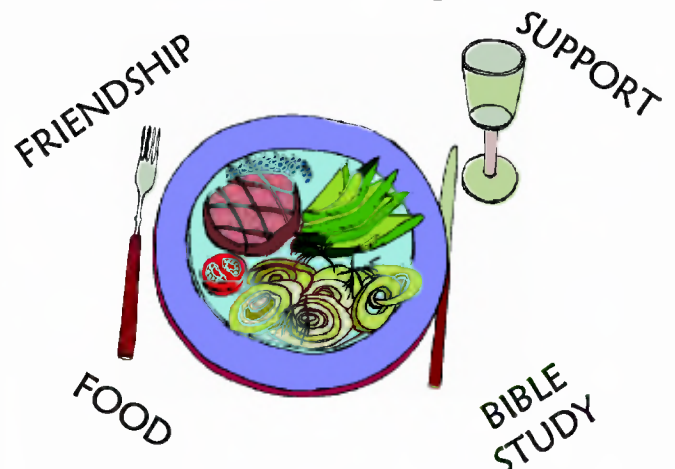

ON THE HOME FRONT

To start off the new school year, two old favourites, cooked a different way!

Spaghetti Bolognese for 4-5

10 slices of bacon chopped, handful of rosemary - leaves picked and roughly chopped, olive oil, 1 large onion, chopped, 1-2 cloves of garlic, crushed, 455g/1lb lean minced steak, 1 wineglass of red wine, 1 level tsp dried oregano, 1 400g/14oz tin of chopped tomatoes, 1 200g/7oz tube of tomato puree, ground black pepper, 455g/1lb spaghetti, 1 handful of fresh basil leaves (optional), 2 handfuls of grated parmesan or strong cheddar (optional)

Preheat oven to 180°C/ gas 4. In a big pot that can go in the oven, fry bacon and rosemary in a little oil till golden. Add onion and garlic and fry for another 3 mins before adding the minced beef. Stir and fry for another 3 mins before adding the wine. Reduce slightly, then add the oregano, tomatoes and puree. Season, bring to the boil, cover and put in the oven for an hour and a half. This tastes great served with the spaghetti, but if you stir in the basil ripped up just before serving, and some cheese over the top it tastes superb. With all those tomatoes and being cooked so long, its a bit rich, but we love it!

Slow Cooked Roasted Vegetable Soup

8 ozs carrots (2" lengths), 8 ozs peeled celeriac, 8 ozs leeks, 8 ozs swede, 1 small chopped onion, 2½ pints vegetable stock, 3 bay leaves, salt & pepper.

Heat oven to 140°C. Place oil in large casserole dish, and add all vegetables, add stock and bring to simmer. Put on lid and place in oven for 3 hours. Leave to cool slightly, remove bay leaves and place mixture in food processor and blend. Gently reheat. Serve with Greek Yoghurt swirled through.

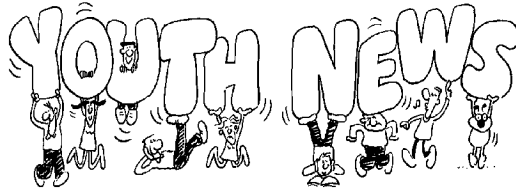

Our summer kicked off with Summer Madness, the biggest Christian Youth Festival in Ireland. It took place over the first 5 days of the summer and was mainly aimed at young people. We had about 48 people in our group, all of whom had the chance to experience all that Summer Madness had to offer, including, Morning and Evening worship, and some really good speakers, some of which came over from America! I think we can speak on behalf of the YF by saying worship was a real challenge, spiritually and personally. Seminars took place throughout the day, with topics such as; body image, discipleship and prayer. Evening events, ranged from discos, local bands and salsa dancing. All in all, the 5 days were amazing and it was great to know everyone in the group (even better than we already do!)

'Holme From Home' is any youth team from Ballyholme Parish that takes part in activities outside of the Parish. On the 19th July a team of approx. 24 travelled up to Ballysillan, in North Belfast, to continue our partnership with Holy Trinity and Ballysillan Youth For Christ (BYFC). We were kindly hosted, housed (in the church halls) and fed by the church. We had the theme for the week of 'Freedom'. We ran a kids club for the week, for about 20 local kids at the church, where we did such activities as T-Shirt painting, singing, and sharing our love for God through our actions and enthusiasm. In the evening time we helped run the evenings at BYFC, or The Blue Houses, as it's fondly known. Many team members had the chance to share their testimony, and we covered topics such as anger, fear, guilt, and pain. We built strong relationships with the members of the community through the kids club and drop in. It was such a great experience to serve God and encourage each other and show the community God's love. Ballysillan will always be in our hearts.

Jumpin' gives us the opportunity to show God's love in our own community, and we were all excited about the week! There were lots of changes to Jumpin' this summer, and we would like to thank Dave Cavan for all the hard work and great ideas he made for the summer Holiday Bible Club. The Tiggers (P1-P3) had two 2 hour sessions each day whilst the Wallabies (P4-P7) had three 2 hour sessions each day. Many activities took place throughout the week including singing, crafts, sport and Veggie Tales DVD's. Through feedback from parents and the debrief of the team, we felt it was a very successful week, and everyone had a good time!

X-Cess is a new week for 1st form and up (formerly known as the Puma's). Main events will be in the evening from 7-10 p.m. and in the afternoon there will be a drop in centre/café. Bands and speakers are coming each evening so that the young people can have a great time with their friends, whilst witnessing God's love.

This summer has been an inspirational experience and we only hope next year will give us another opportunity to serve God at a youth group.

The Quiet Page

In the round of what we do as a parish family over the course of an average week, between services and meetings, home groups and organisations, hospital calls and family visits – all the things that so valuably but quickly fill our time, there's a very neat little verse of Scripture in the Acts of Apostles which clarifies what it is in practical terms that we really can't do without.

It's St Luke describing the sermon of Peter on the day of Pentecost, that wonderful Spirit filled address which moved three thousand souls to respond to the Lord's offer of forgiveness. After they were baptised, according to Acts 2:42, *They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.*

Now if these words ring a bell with you, perhaps it's from the Confirmation service where the bishop asks the candidates: 'Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread and the prayers?' The candidates' answer is equally direct: 'With the help of God I will.'

It was Prime Minister John Major who said famously that there were three features of English life worth fighting for: cricket, warm beer, and the sight of ladies cycling to early Communion on a misty Sunday morning. Well, Acts 2:42 lists the three essential features of Church life. Leave one of these precious gifts out and in New Testament terms our worship is deficient.

All the churches in which I have ever led worship have had one thing in common: they thought their way of doing it was the only way! But in Bible terms there are only three fundamentals and while the needs of those who do come regularly to worship are important, so are the needs of those who don't.

If we're not worshipping God, we're worshipping something else.

This is for a trial period and to help people get home earlier in the dark winter evenings.



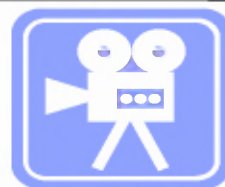
THE CINEMA CLUB
