Praising:

When Jesus came to Jordan to be baptized by John, He did not come for pardon, but as his Father's Son. He came to share repentance with all who mourn their sins,

To speak the vital sentence with which good news begins.

Reading:

Mark 1:1-13 Jesus is Baptised

Mark's Gospel has an instant pace and immediacy about it. We are plunged straight into Jesus' good news narrative with a reference from the prophet Malachi about the coming of one who would prepare Christ's way. And so John the baptiser is introduced and we find ourselves

at the River Jordan. Everyone knows the physical sensation of coming up out of water: catching our breath to refill our lungs. opening our eyes to see and reorientate ourselves, feeling the water drip from our faces and bodies. But this is also an illustration of how new life in Christ should be for all of us. It's a combination of feeling cleansed, refreshed and invigorated, all in one, with that added momentary sense of alarm and energy as we emerge slightly disorientated – feeling that we are not completely in control.

Listening:

Praying:

Lord you spoke words of love to Jesus at his baptism so we pray today

- for those feeling unloved by those close to them, forgotten by family, let down by friends
- for those feeling rejected by society, overlooked by the state, unprotected by the law
- for those who feel judged by religion, condemned by opinion, insulted by prejudice
