Reading:

Acts 26:24-32
Festus and Agrippa respond to
Paul's testimony

Festus dismisses Paul's story as sheer madness. Sensing that Agrippa has been touched by the truth of what he has heard, Paul promptly gives voice to his observation. For Festus, the easy way out is to say that Paul has lost grip on reality. Agrippa's approach is to tease Paul that he has not persuaded him to become a Christian quite so

quickly as that. Paul leaves everyone present in no doubt that persuading people to become Christians is his avowed aim and purpose. None of those listening to Paul can see any reason why he should be on trial before anyone, let alone the Emperor. Having first summoned Paul to their presence in the audience hall, it is now Festus, Agrippa and party who leave Paul's presence – though he is still wearing the chains of the prisoner.

Listening:

Praying:
