Here comes Summer!

Strawberry Zabaglione

3 eggs, yolks only, 85g/3oz caster sugar, 1 vanilla pod, seeds only, 2 tbsp white wine, 140g/5oz strawberries, halved

Bring some water to the boil in a large saucepan. Place a bowl over the saucepan. Place the eggs, sugar, vanilla and wine in the bowl. Whisk continuously until smooth and thick and coming away from the sides of the bowl. Remove the bowl from the heat.

Place the strawberries on a flat plate. Top with the zabaglione.

Take a kitchen blow-torch and heat the zabaglione until golden, alternatively place the plate under a hot grill.

Milk Tart

A South African recipe, courtesy of Debbie Smyth

Mix 1

1 tin condensed milk, 2½ tins water (reserve a little of this - ½ cup for Mix 2)

Mix 2

3 heaped tabsp cornflour, reserved water from mix 1, 2 egg yolks

Mix 3

2 well beaten egg whites, 1 teasp vanilla essence



Put mix 1 into pot on the stove and bring almost to the boil - **watch carefully and stir well** (little bubbles appear around the sides). Pull off the stove and gradually add mix 2 while stirring well. Replace on heat and cook, also stirring well, then remove from heat.

Beat egg white and vanilla essence until there is a good volume. Fold this into the hot mix until smooth, and then pour into prepared pie shell and sprinkle liberally with cinnamon.

Serve cold

The pie shell can be simply and quickly made using broken digestive biscuits, or can be made with a shortbread mixture. (Alternatively, you could go to Marks and Spencers and buy one!)



The Boy With No Shoes by William Horwood

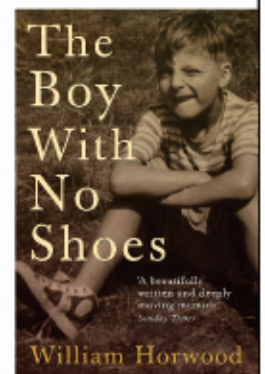
Written by William Horwood this book is an account of the author's own childhood. It is written as a memoir of a boy called Jimmy Rova as the author said it was too painful to write in the first person. It is the story of a small boy who

seems to matter to nobody. His mother is cruel in her neglect of him, not even seeming to register his existence, and his brother and cousin are spiteful tormentors who spend their time picking on him or ignoring him. Jimmy also suffers from what he calls "Darktime" - childhood depression which overcomes him when he is at his lowest ebb.

Fortunately a loving grandmother enters Jimmy's life and he blossoms under her care and attention. Finally he has someone to be his friend, and most importantly, to love him. She encourages him to improve at school but even with her help it is no easy ride as Jimmy tackles grammar school and becoming an adult.

The book deals with the issues of loss, depression and abuse(both mental and physical) - but while on occasions leaving the reader close to tears, there is a theme of redemption - of little Jimmy Rova becoming bigger and stronger than the people who would drag him down.

This is not one of those books that will haunt you; it is about abuse, but of a subtle kind. It is a gentle story which draws you in and carries you along, finally reaching the most amazing ending, to a most amazing story. Published by Headline at £6.99 (paperback).

JAMES BAAKI HIS STORY

Bishop "Fanta" Clarke at the Bangor Convention 22nd - 29th August

Each week day morning at 11.30 the speaker will be the Rt. Rev. Ken Clarke, Bishop of Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh. He was brought up in Hollywood and studied at Trinity College, Dublin. Bishop Ken has worked across Ireland and also in S. America and is passionate about people - and about mission! A keen sports fan, he enjoys watching rugby and is a passionate Manchester United supporter.

James was born into the Dinka Tribe living in a little village just south of Darfur. During his early years a war started, between the government of Sudan and those who lived in the South, possibly because of the oil deposits there. Villages were systematically bombed and destroyed, hundreds of thousands died and families left broken and homeless.

During the fierce fighting and running from the enemy, James was separated from his family and at 13 years of age joined 45 thousand walking to Euthopia. He understood his parents and siblings had all been killed. The refugees were frequently bombed, others died from starvation and/or wounds. The trek took many weeks of hiding, dodging planes and the army. James doesn't remember the last weeks of the trek or how he ever managed to reach the Refugee Camp. Food was provided, one bowl for a dozen people had only enough for ten. Here James heard about Jesus and started to follow Him.

Several years later the Refugee Camp was closed and the survivors had to walk to Northern Kenya to another. The new Refugee Camp had a school and 17 yrs old James learnt to read and to study. Some years later he was offered the opportunity to go to America and become a citizen there. The future looked bright but God was speaking to him, and telling him to go to Sudan. James was very puzzled, "weren't his family all dead and the village destroyed?" He trusted God, and set out for Sudan. Every member of his family was alive and now educated and able to read the scriptures in English, James led all his family to know Jesus Christ as their Saviour. He gained more knowledge and was ordained into the ministry of the Sudan Episcopal (Anglican) Church. As life became a little more peaceful, although the war was not then over, his Bishop invited a man from England to come to the first Synod to be held in that Diocese. The Bishop had met this man on a Mission Aviation Fellowship flight, so James was to be Kenneth Hearn's interpreter! Many opportunities were gained through this and many Pastors, Leaders and Church workers gained teaching, eventually the New Testament in their own Dinka Rek language and bicycles to travel the distances in their big parishes.

James has just returned to Nairobi after 3 weeks in N. Ireland and the Salisbury Diocese. Gifts have been given that will enable more pastors and church workers to have a New Testament in their language, some villages have one N.T. between them! He is studying for a Theology Degree in Kenya so that he can serve his God and the Church more fully. He is now 37 yrs old and has a wife Martha and two young children.

A Spiritual Journey of Friendship

A spiritual journey that led two Ballyholme parishioners on a new path in the church also led to a strong friendship.

When Elaine Perry and Michelle Savage signed up for baptism and

confirmation classes they didn't realise quite what that journey would mean. Not only did both women embark on their spiritual journey together, they also became friends in the process.

A total of 19 people of various ages, from teenagers to mature adults, were presented by the Rectors of Ballyhome, Donaghadee and Helen's Bay and the confirmation service itself was held in St Philip's and St James church in Holywood.

Throughout the classes, Elaine said she and Michelle got to know each other well and Michelle also confirmed that she found it great that she wasn't going through the experience on her own. Elaine said the whole service of baptism and confirmation went well, Bishop Harold was a "lovely" person and the music was "beautiful." Elaine explained that she had been through a "traumatic" time recently and St Columbanus church had been "very supportive" to her. "Their faith rubbed off on me and I realised there was more to do than going to church once a month." When she read in the parish magazine about adult confirmation classes it sparked off a response in her. "Going forward for confirmation at my age meant more to me than when I was a youngster and it was the thing to do. It is more thought provoking at this age," she added. She hopes that by doing this interview it may encourage other adults to follow in her footsteps.

As a child, her family moved about frequently due to her father's job but Elaine added "Coming to the parish and St Columbanus church was the first time I felt I had put roots down. I felt a sense of belonging". Elaine is a member of the WI, the Horticultural Society and also finds time to fit in her Tai Chi classes on a regular basis.

Michelle concurred with much of what Elaine had said and added that Elaine rang her before they were to receive Communion for the first time in St Columbanus and they arranged to go together to the service. "It was very emotional for both of us. It was nice to have her there and we both had a wee cry," she revealed. Michelle was brought up as a Presbyterian but four or five years ago she began

attending St Columbanus. She vividly recalled her first visit to the church - when she got out of her car in the car park the first person she encountered was Renee Bradley who was "very friendly and welcoming". Renee then walked down to the church with her and introduced her to the then Churchwarden Cyril Anderson who led her to a seat in the church. In an echo of Elaine's words, Michelle said she felt as if she "fitted in" right from the start. When Simon mentioned the adult confirmation classes, it immediately sparked a response in Michelle too. "After the first class I felt that I was meant to be there. I learnt so much," she said. On the day of her baptism and confirmation Elaine was teaching in school but could feel the emotion getting to her. By coincidence, the American actor Henry Winkler (forever known as The Fonz in Happy Days) was in school that day and at one stage he asked her if she was OK, obviously picking up on the fact that she was somewhat distracted. After Michelle explained why she was feeling so emotional he said to her "I'm Jewish but I am so happy for you" which Michelle says summed how down to earth he was. As a lovely touch, Michelle chose not only her Mum and Dad as her sponsors but also her husband Mark and two-year-old daughter Amy, because, as she said "They had all helped me on my spiritual journey" so it was important that they had such an

integral part to play in the ceremony. Amy had to practice hard for her special role - saying "We do" at the appropriate time. As Bishop Harold came to the front to perform the baptism Michelle says she could feel her bottom lip "trembling" with emotion but Elaine lifted the moment with a funny remark.

And the fact that the bath had "B&Q Water Butt" written on the side of it also helped lighten the moment. With her second baby on the way in September Michelle has no intention of slowing down - she has already volunteered to help out with a new house group system being set up in the church. So keen was she to illustrate how much an impact that confirmation has had on both their lives that Michelle rang to say that both she and Elaine had an "incredible" high after the confirmation. "We both felt exactly the same way and we haven't come back down off that high yet," she added.

Have your say!

Taking the best of the past into the future



To add to the Vestry and the 70 people who came on the Parish Away Day in March, nearly 50 people took part in a series of discussions in the Parish Centre on Wednesday 3 June. Others were due to attend a second session on Monday 29 June and many who could not be present for the conversations put their thoughts on paper using the 'blue-sky' response sheets. We wanted everyone in the parish to have an input and while we tried to cast the net as widely as possible it's not too late to make your contribution. There are plenty of spare response sheets in the parish office or with the clergy - please ask for one and let us know your thoughts.

Just to be clear at this stage:

- Nothing is cast in concrete: our Rector and Vestry have been discussing a range of ideas which they are simply trying to work through with us all. The need for transparency and consultation is clear to everyone concerned, hence '*On the Way - have your say!*'
- There are as many different outlooks and opinions as there are parishioners, though broadly speaking, and probably by dint of personality, while some seem comfortable with change, others seem less so. Talking and listening, give and take is required all round.
- Many of the challenges we face are not unique to Ballyholme: many if not most other churches in most other parts of the world are struggling hard for a breakthrough with these issues, perhaps especially in the area of young people and worship.
- Some of what has been discussed can be implemented almost immediately, other areas will take years to plan and execute. In the meantime, no doubt certain events will overtake us and other new opportunities will present themselves.
- The financial implications of what we have been discussing have not been forgotten and nor has the Parish Centre debt. The Vestry has asked a small group to suggest a co-ordinated way forward.

Your 'have your say' responses will be collated over the summer and should give structure and substance to the Vestry's efforts to set some new pastoral priorities for the next stage of our Church's life and witness. The exercise is to be as clear as we can about what we want to achieve in the run up to 2015 (the 1400th anniversary of the death of St Columbanus) and in the years which follow that. It is the task of the Rector and Vestry to settle on what they believe to be God's way forward for Ballyholme. They have done their best to canvas opinion from you the people of God and many excellent suggestions have been forthcoming alongside some significant areas of concern. The next stage is for them to draw everything together and begin to set a programme.

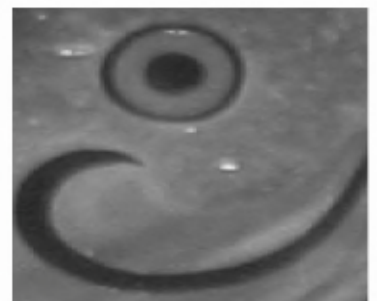

Get ready for an information overload... welcome to Summer 2009 in Ballyholme Parish, full of lots of new things, changes to dates and a lot of excitement!

This year we have 28 young people from our parish heading out around the world, 22 heading off to Uganda in August, 5 to Kenya in July and 1 going out to America. So because of this, our normal dates for the summer are having to change!

3rd -7th July - Summer Madness - We are taking a smaller group than normal to Summer Madness, hopefully this will be an opportunity to spend some proper time with people, building on relationships that have been growing over the year.

11th -18th July - 'Holme from Home Team - Ballysillan - This will be our third year sending a team up to North Belfast to stay in Holy Trinity, Old Park. This year we didn't want to stand still we wanted to push things forward, we wanted to challenge ourselves so we are teaming up with the Bluehouses (Ballysillan Youth For Christ) again to help run their summer 'drop-in' programme. This year we will be there over the 12th July celebrations and be a real presence in the community. We are really excited about this!

20th -24th July - Jumpin' - Hot on the heels of Ballysillan, we have our Jumpin' programme that has been brought forward into July because of the huge numbers heading to Uganda in August. Instead of cancelling it we thought it was important to build on the improvements made at last summer and this Easter's events! As all the money collected will go towards our summer teams we have upped the entry to £3 per child per day. Jumpin' is open to anyone going into P1-P7, Sessions are from 10-12 each morning, 2-4pm and 7-9pm (this session only for P4-7). Reg opens at 9.30 on the Monday Morning!! We look forward to seeing you all!!

27th -31st July - X-Cess - After the success of last year we are running a separate week for the older young people, focused on Form 1-3, but if you are older feel free to call down! We run from 2-4pm and 7-11pm each day. We charge £3 each night, where there is a speaker and a band, whilst in the afternoon we run a 'drop in', which we don't charge for!

We have a huge tuck shop running at both Jumpin' and X-Cess which we try and keep stocked but with the rate that things are sold that can be tough! So bring some spare change for that sweet tooth (that applies to parents too).

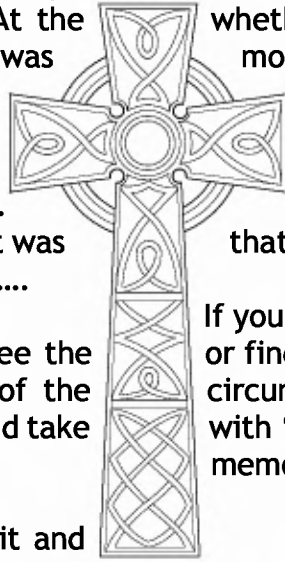

St Columbanus Walkers at Glenshane

Where exactly are the hills with names like Bohilbrega and Craig-na-Shoke or streams like the Blackbog or Uberdwalty Burns? Not in some remote part of the far West, as you might guess, but just off the main Londonderry Road as it reaches its highest point at the Glenshane Pass.

It was good to welcome back old friends Alistair and Roy and new recruit Kay as a turnout of 14 walkers gathered on Saturday 6 June to head for the Sperrins. A stiff northerly had turned the weather cold for the time of year and mitts and woolly hats were much in evidence as we began our ascent through Glenshane Forest,



following the Ulster Way and hugging the banks of the emergent River Roe. Gaining height we left the trees behind and headed towards the summit of Bohilbrega from where we eventually completed a great circular hill route of more than 10 miles. Our route was strewn with large areas of eroded peat resulting in lots of sliding and scrambling and very little straightforward walking. Absence of tracks was a further feature of the area with the result that navigation was achieved mainly by following fences which are fortunately featured on the Ordnance Survey's Sperrins Outdoor Pursuits map.

Relaxing over coffee and chocolate biscuits at our traditional stop on the way home there was quiet satisfaction at the day's achievement and agreement that this was probably our toughest ever outing. A couple of 'easy' walks are planned for the summer, so do join us on July 4th for the Dunluce to Giant's Causeway outing (meet in car park at 8.30am) and on 8th August to Slievenaslacht at Castlewellan (meet 9am).
