Thank you for all your kindness following the recent death of my Mum. Having accompanied you through your family bereavements, my turn was coming. Now we're in that first year of anniversaries, birthdays and holidays which won't ever be quite the same, but which Mum would only want us to relish and enjoy absolutely as normal. That she was a person of faith certainly helps, as do the spiritual truths at the heart of Remembrance-tide, Advent and Christmas. My mother grew up in Ballymartin Co Down, between Annalong and Kilkeel, and I have mentioned in sermons the walk to 'the shore' which remained the essence of home for her long after she was last able to revisit it. At her funeral, I ended my Tribute with Eric Milner-White's words from the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols which catch many of the themes of this season. Along with so many of your loved ones, my loved one now rejoices with us "but upon another shore, and in a greater light". She's part of "that multitude which no man can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, and with whom we for evermore are one." Comfort and joy indeed.

At the September Vestry meeting, our Treasurer reported the excellent news that an additional £16,970 per annum has been pledged towards the cost of our new full-time curate (who began on 1 September) in a mixture of Standing Orders and gifts.

Thank you to all those who pledged so promptly and so generously to our appeal. The Vestry is extremely encouraged by this solid opening response and now hopes that those remaining parish families who can raise their giving will do so soon.

We require a further £1,300 per month. This is 65 more families pledging just £20 per month. One-off donations with Gift Aid declarations will also be gratefully received. Your financial and prayerful support for the work of God in Ballyholme remains essential and much appreciated.

Our young people have also planned a fund-raiser to make their contribution to the costs.



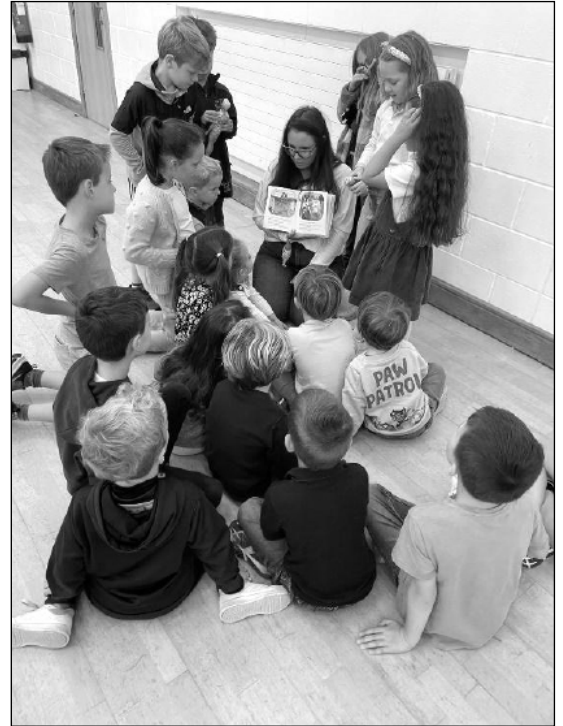
Muddy Church

Introducing Bishop Lindsay Urwin OGS

Bishop Lindsay was appointed an Area Bishop in the Diocese of Chichester at the age of 37. It would be more than a decade before the Anglican Communion would create a younger bishop. Previously a vicar in south London and a Diocesan Missioner, Bishop Lindsay’s subsequent appointments included the Anglican Shrine at Walsingham and the parish of Brunswick in his native diocese of Melbourne, Australia.



Among the reasons people may remember Bishop Lindsay is his now-legendary run-in with Ali G. Booked by Channel 4 to give an interview on ‘youth culture’, he had no prior warning that the un-named presenter would turn out to be the fictional rude-boy creation of comedian Sacha Baron Cohen. Bishop Lindsay realised it was a set-up during the interview, and as you can see for yourself on YouTube, he used the surprise opportunity to his advantage...

Bishop Lindsay made the ecclesiastical headlines again in 2018, when his younger sister Kate Prowd was made a bishop in Australia. It is believed they are the only brother-sister bishops in the Anglican Communion. Retiring back to the UK in 2023, Bishop Lindsay now



now exercises an international ministry as a preacher and teacher. Having had no contact with him for at least a decade, an email he sent me out of the blue last November warmed my cockles, and then some!

How do I know him? Keen to postpone becoming a rector for as long as possible, after my curacy in Belfast, I served for three years as Bishop Lindsay's chaplain. Oh the scrapes we got into... and out of, I should add! Of many highlights from my Horsham years, a major one was the ten day pilgrimage we

organised for 54 people to Rome and Assisi. That wasn't a patch, mind you, on Saturday 3 November 2001 at St Dunstan's Church, Mayfield when Bishop Lindsay presided at Heidi and my wedding!

Ministry Among Weeds and Hedge Trimmers

Saint Fiacre, the patron saint of gardeners, is celebrated not only for his skill in cultivating gardens but also for a delightful legend involving weeds. It is said that his garden was so meticulously tended—and so blessed—that even the weeds obeyed him. A mere command would make a stubborn plant shrink or vanish, leaving behind only healthy flowers and fragrant herbs. Clearly, Saint Fiacre never faced the challenge of gardening in North Down! While some blame climate change, I suspect Ballyholme harbours its own peculiar breed of weed. Expose it to even a single burst of sunshine, and it seems to grow and stretch before your very eyes. No sooner had we tamed June's wild growth than we realised Ground Force would need to be summoned again, as a former curate put it, to 'put manners on the weeds.'

So, the 7th of October was set. The call went out. And at 10.00am, the faithful arrived armed with an arsenal of rakes, fancy pruners, plastic gloves, shovels and hedge trimmers ready to wrestle weeds, tame hedges, and wage war on wayward flowerbeds. My contribution was a rusty, weathered brush, unsure if its shaft still belonged to its bristle head.



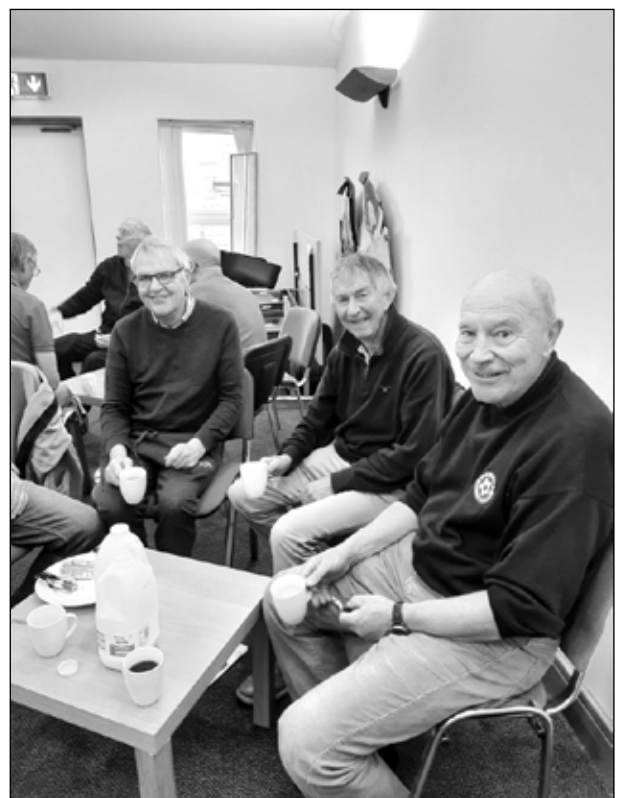
As we got to work, something striking stood out to me. Each person instinctively reached for their tool and used it with quiet confidence—the kind that only comes from knowing your instrument's quirks and limits. Some tools gleamed with freshness, others showed the careful upkeep of diligent hands, still others were seasoned veterans, marked with the wear and tear of countless church clean-ups. Yet none, including my brush, were useless. Every tool had a role. Every hand made a difference. Every blister was a badge of honour—and perhaps a reminder for the curate to bring proper gloves next time.

Some trimmed. Some snipped. Some hauled. Some dug. Some raked. No one directed us, yet everyone joined in. As I worked—reflecting on ministry, as

curates are prone to do—I wondered if there was a lesson here: simply showing up with what we have, offering it to God, and watching Him weave our scattered efforts into something beautiful.

St. Paul's words from 1 Corinthians 12 echoed in my mind: "The body is made up of many parts." On Tuesday, those parts looked a little different—as they held shears, shovels, and secateurs. Yet it served as a gentle reminder that ministry doesn't always wear a surplice or a stole, nor sound like a sermon or a song. Sometimes, it appears as muddy boots, aching backs, and shared laughter beneath a bright autumn sky.

God never asks us to bring what we don't have. He simply asks us to bring what we do—and to bring it with a willing heart. In John's Gospel, a boy offers Jesus five loaves and two fish. It's not much,

but it's enough. The boy doesn't apologise for the size of his lunch—he just gives it. And Jesus multiplies it. That's the essence of shared ministry. We don't compare our tools, talents, or time. We bring them—and trust God to use them. Some of us are spiritual rakes—good at gathering people in. Some are clippers—we gently prune and shape. Some are wheelbarrows—we carry others' burdens when they're too heavy to lift alone. Whatever we are, whatever we bring—it matters. When we offer it together in unity, even the messiest garden can be transformed into something beautiful.

Wednesday morning, on my way to Holy Communion, the church grounds looked immaculate. The flowerbeds were neat, the hedges perfectly trimmed, and there was no longer any need to duck under branches on the path to the sacristy. I couldn't help thinking Saint Fiacre would nod in approval.

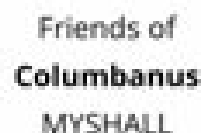
